

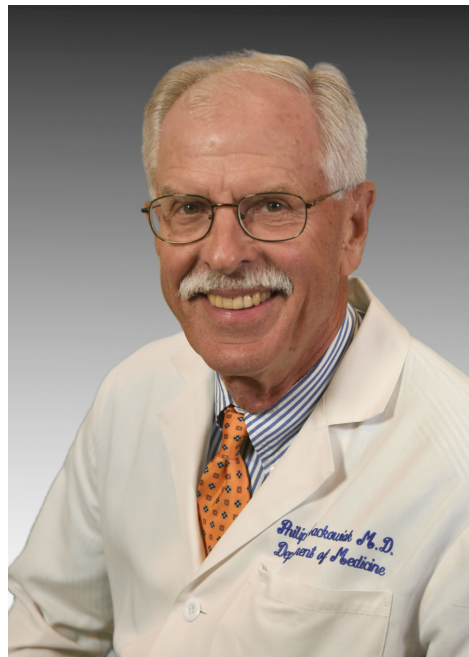

### *Pericles and the Plague of Athens*



Dr. Philip Mackowiak is Emeritus Professor of Medicine and the Carolyn Frenkil and Selvin Passen History of Medicine Scholar in Residence at the University of Maryland School of Medicine and a Senior Lecturer in the Department of History at the University of Maryland College Park. He is a Master of the American College of Physicians. He is a graduate of Bucknell University (BS Biology), University of Maryland (MD), and the Johns Hopkins University (MBA). He began his career in academic medicine as an Epidemic Intelligence Officer with the Centers for Disease Control in the early 70's. In 1975, he joined the faculty of the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School in Dallas, rising to the rank of Professor of Medicine before joining the faculty of the University of Maryland School of Medicine in 1988.

In addition to his extensive bibliography of peer reviewed papers, editorials, and book chapters, Dr. Mackowiak has received a number of accolades for his role as a teacher and mentor. He has been selected several times as Faculty Marshall and Mace Bearer. He has been the recipient of a House Staff Teaching award, the Student Council Faculty Award, the Maryland ACP Chapter's Theodore E. Woodward, MD Award for teaching excellence, and in 2019, the Maryland

ACP Chapter established a medical student award in his name. Dr. Mackowiak was selected as the graduation speaker at the University of Maryland School of Medicine's Bicentennial Celebration.

Dr. Mackowiak is perhaps best known for his book, *Fever*, now in its second edition, and his internationally-acclaimed series of Historical Clinicopathological Conferences. He is the author of *Post Mortem. Solving History's great medical Mysteries*, the sequel, *Diagnosing Giants. Solving the Medical Mysteries of Thirteen Patients Who Changed the World*, and *Patients as Art. Forty Thousand years of Medical History in Drawings, Paintings, and Sculpture*. These works earned Dr. Mackowiak the American College of physicians' 2010 Nicholas E. Davies Memorial Scholar Award for Scholarly Activities in the Humanities and History of Medicine and have established him as one of today's foremost medical historians
